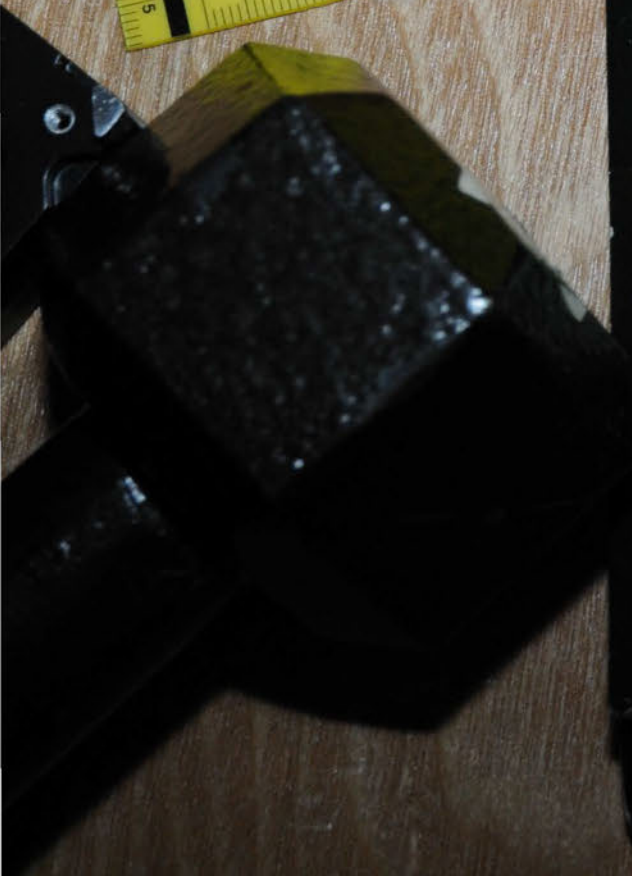

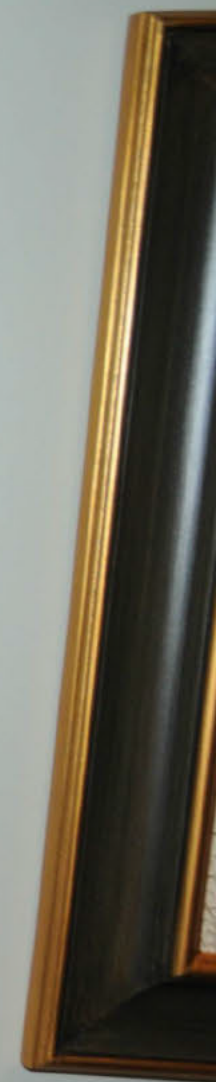

gun to his shoulder, took aim and fired
into the group of boys and girls, none
of whom were more than 12 years of
age. After discharging the weapon,
Ferguson ran away without stopping to
ascertain what the result of his dan-
gerously act had been.

The aim taken was a good one, and
several of the children were wounded,
the most serious of the injuries being
sustained by Frank Barnes, aged 10
years, residing on Lander Street. He
received upwards of 20 shots in various
parts of the upper portion of the body,
11 being in the face, three in the neck,
several in the ear, cutting away a small
portion, two in the scalp and one direct-
ly in the edge of the eye. The right
hand received a half dozen, and the
thick woolen jacket was filled with the
small pieces of lead. Joseph Stapleton
and Lawrence Tobin are known to have
been injured, but it is not certain
at the present whether any of the others
were hurt or not. The sisters in charge

Hipe Ferguson Pleads Not Guilty—The
Wounded Boys Testify to the Shooting
Yesterday.

The shooting of the school children on
Gidney Avenue yesterday morning, by
"Hipe" Ferguson, created no little ex-
citement in the Fourth Ward, and it was
fortunate indeed for the old scoundrel
that none of the victims were seriously
injured, for it would have gone hard
with him indeed had it been otherwise.
As it was, there was some talk of form-
ing a vigilance gang last night and giv-
ing the gunner a dose of what he had
himself attempted—the administration
of satisfaction without recourse to law.
Wiser counsels prevailed, however, and
it was left for the courts to give him
what he so justly deserves.

Ferguson is a man of 71 years of age,
and very irritable. This has made him
for some time past the butt of ridicule
for children on the street, and when the
annoyances occur he assaults or insults
the first child or person he meets. We
have been told of a dozen instances in
which he has grossly insulted ladies,
and are cognizant of an instance in
which he kicked and beat a four year
old child he found playing in a hall-
way on South Street, the bruises being
plainly seen for days after the kicking
occurred. Some children had been call-
ing out "Hipe" at him as he passed
along the street, and when he gave chase
they entered the hallway and passed
through the building. Hipe followed,
and when he got in the
way found only this little girl, and he
wreaked his revenge upon her. This
can be proven if need be, as can the in-
sults to ladies. Under the circum-
stances counsellor Seeger has a bad case
